How to define inspirational leadership

'm a huge fan of Gen. David Goldfein's bold vision to achieve joint warfighting excellence in an era of strategic competition.

In the Air Force's Chief of Staff's seminal podcast titled "War on the Rocks," he underscored the importance of the fundamental fighting formation of the Air Force: the squadron.

The pursuit of revitalizing squadrons has many elements. Goldfein said our investment in building inspirational leaders is one of his top priorities because it holds the most potential for lasting impact. He also said inspirational squadron commanders and leaders set the culture within squadrons and that culture

impacts everything we do from retention to readiness to innovation. "A career in the Air

Force is as rich as we

can make it and it's a rich and rewarding experience because, first, you're part of a squadron that has the culture that embraces you, (makes) vou feel like you're doing something of value (and) that it's important work that makes a difference."

At first glance, that sounds simple enough. The human element of squadron revitalization requires a strong squadron culture and building that team culture requires inspirational leadership. But simple in the military is rarely easy. In the fog and friction of war, what's

often overlooked or taken for granted is the role of inspiring leaders building and fostering their squadron's culture. During one of our 22nd Airlift Squadron strategy sessions, one of my senior noncommissioned officers asked a great question, "How do you define inspirational leadership and keep it from becoming an overused buzzword that dilutes its meaning?"

That one question really got me thinking: What does inspirational leadership look like? If it's simple and known to all of us, why are all of us not always inspirational leaders?

Inspirational leadership is something that can be difficult to put your finger on; we know it

when we see it and want to follow it.

To inspire is to stir or rouse the heart, mind or spirit from within. Motivation is an external factor. Ideas and people inspire – results and outcomes motivate. A leader's courage may inspire you to action but the fear of failing your fitness test may motivate you to run.

After brainstorming numerous attributes of inspirational leadership, I narrowed the list down to what I considered the most essential in the context of the squadron. Here's my top 10 list of inspirational leader traits:

1. Craft a compelling vision of the future and clearly communicate it.

2. Impart personal meaning in connecting to the team's mission and drive developing the team both individually and as

a whole.

3. Create a safe environment with a sense of belonging and ownership.

4. Put the team first and back them up.

5. Admit mistakes, show vulnerability and foster a growth mindset.

6. Build trust.

7. Make bold decisions, take risks and keep cool under pres-

8. Pursue relentless authenticity, feedback and transpar-

9. Lead with empathy, empower the team and make it

10. Live the values of the

This list of inspiring traits is context-dependent and admittedly not all-inclusive, but it may offer a point of departure

Travis pilot reinforces Pacific partnerships

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea — When the U.S. military is a guest in another country, it's important to go above and beyond to be the best neighbor one can be.

U.S. Air Force Capt. Jason Lim, a KC-10 Extender pilot assigned to the 6th Air Refueling Squadron out of Travis Air Force Base, California, dedicated a year toward this goal: Striving to strengthen the partnership between the Republic of Korea and U.S. Air Forces.


"The opportunity kind of just fell in my lap, and I took it," said Lim, a 32-year-old Korean-American native of Los Angeles, California. "I really love Korea: the food, the culture, the friends, the family here. This was actually one of my dreams, to come back to Korea after I first joined the Air Force."

By the time Lim graduated from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University of Florida in 2007, he'd earned his flight instructor license and planned to teach students to fly for general aviation pur-

Thus began his career in the ROK as a flight instructor at Hanseo University. Initially, he only planned to stay for a year, but he enjoyed it so much that one year became two, three, and then four

Pregnant volunteers sought for research study

The labor and delivery unit at David Grant USAF Medical Center at Travis Air Force Base is seeking healthy pregnant women with low risk of complications during delivery to take part in a research study to evaluate the impact of eating while in labor.

The study, which began in October 2017, is the first to consider a military population and will help military hospitals provide pregnant women the best care possible, said Lt. Col. Dawn-Kimberly Hopkins, 60th Medical Group chief of clinical research.

"There are some studies that allow women to have protein drinks and carbohydrate drinks but no solid foods," said Hopkins. "We want to investigate the effect of a solid-food option since women expend a lot of energy during labor."

While women have long expressed the desire to eat and drink while in labor, current guidelines from the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, as well as the American Society of Anesthesiologists, restrict oral intake to clear liquids.

Women who give birth in birthing centers or at home have the option of eating solid foods, but those who deliver in military hospitals and in many U.S. hospitals are restricted to clear liquids.

"We know some women eat excessively before they come in, which can lead to increased nausea or vomiting during labor," said Hopkins.

Also, over eating can over extend the stomach, putting a woman at risk of choking if doctors need to perform a cesarean delivery, she said.

To participate in the study. volunteers must be TRICARE beneficiaries ages 18 and older who plan to deliver at DGMC. Also, they must be at 37 weeks gestation or greater with only one baby developing in the uterus.

Women in the high-risk category will not be accepted. This includes those with a pre-

Everyone is invited to attend, including families and visitors will be eligible for prizes and souvenirs.

At mealtime, those in active labor – meaning they have a cervical dilation of 6 centimeters or more - will receive either clear liquids such as broth, jello and juice or a low-fat, low-residue diet which includes a meat. WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE. Ohio -Stroke is the leading cause of serious, long-term adult disability in the United States. The effects of a stroke range from mild to severe and can include paralysis, problems with thinking, difficulty with speaking, symptoms and how to reduce and emotional problems.

According to the National Institutes of Health, each year, nearly 800,000 Americans experience a new or recurrent stroke. Approximately 610,000 of these are first attacks, and 185,000 are recurrent attacks. Stroke is the fifth-leading cause of death in the US, killing nearly 133,000 people a year and accounting for one of every 19 deaths. Nearly three-quarters of all strokes occur in people over the age of 65 and the risk of having stroke more than doubles each decade after the age of 55.

Americans have shown that stroke is preventable and treatable. In recent years, a better understanding of the causes of stroke has helped Americans make lifestyle changes that have cut the stroke death rate mon cause for the rupture nearly in half.

What is a stroke?

A stroke occurs when a blood vessel that carries oxygen and nutrients to the brain is either blocked by a clot or bursts. Brain cells in the immediate area begin to die because they stop getting the oxygen and nutrients they need to

What causes a stroke?

A blockage of a blood vessel in the brain or neck, called an ischemic stroke, is the most frequent cause of stroke and is responsible for about 80 percent of strokes.



EOD Airmen detect, disarm, protect downrange

KANDAHAR AIRFIELD. Afghanistan — The Joint Defense Operations Center calls about a confirmed or suspected explosive ordnance disposal incident. Three Airmen rush out the door, set up their truck and immediately depart for the incident site. They head out with a security element to safely transport them to the location. For them it is now an information game and race against time.

"It is a constant cat and mouse game where everyone is constantly evolving," said Staff Sgt. Drew Tesser, a 753rd Ordnance Company EOD technician at Kandahar Airfield. "We need every bit of information we can get from long range reconnaissance before we make a hard decision to disarm or detonate the suspected improvised explosive de-

The team utilizes different types of

equipment from remote controlled robots to small unmanned aerial systems to provide reconnaissance on a potential hazard site.

"My biggest job is to try and keep the guys in the truck and not have them get out and go to the hazard site," said Staff Sgt. Joshua Holbrook, the equipment manager assigned to the 753rd Ordnance Company. "We can use our robot to scout out the area for potential wires or pressure plates, as well as using our unmanned aerial system to get a bird's eye view of the area before making the decision to go down to the site."

These technicians' jobs consist of protecting the service members at Kandahar by doing route clearance patrols and flightline support. They are also responsible for supporting the Train Advise Assist Command - South mission by traveling with an advisory package to ensure the locals are trained properly to protect their country from potential

To be eligible to attend the school, Airmen have to complete a wide array of tests: rappel tower operations, ruck layout and sling load inspections. the Army physical fitness test, an obstacle course and a 12mile ruck march.

"There are very few opportunities for Airmen to go to AAS and the BDG is one of the only units that gives their Airmen the chance to attend, so I wanted to take advantage of that." Groomes said. "It's a great opportunity for Airmen to (assess) themselves and learn what things they need to improve, not only physically, but mentally to push through."

While still having to pass all proficiency tests, Airmen were required to perform constant remedial physical training throughout the duration of the assessment to test their physical and mental resiliency.

"The biggest thing I needed, to get through (the assessment). was a strong drive and motivation," Lewis said. "Being selfaware and keeping my mental composure through very intense situations was kev.'



Army therapy dog visits Airmen

KANDAHAR AIRFIELD, Afghanistan — Maintenance personnel got a surprise visit from a therapy dog as part of an effort to showcase the various mental health resources available Feb. 2 at Kandahar Airfield, Afghanistan.

Air Force religious affairs Airmen from the 451st Air Expeditionary Group teamed up with an Army behavioral health team from Train Advise and Assist Command-South. They made their way through various shops within the 451st Expeditionary Aircraft Maintenance Squadron allowing Airmen and personnel to interact with Eden, an Army therapy dog.

Chaplains and religious affairs Airmen make routine visits across the installation to ensure Airmen and personnel understand the resources available for advice, counseling or friendly conversations. Individuals may come to chaplains with personal or professional concerns, but sometimes, elevating the situation to a more qualified medical professional is necessary.

"Certain issues need to be seen by professionals, so we do these rounds to establish a relationship with Airmen," said Air Force Staff Sgt. Matthew Daniel, 451st AEG religious affairs Airman.

Army Maj. Sal Bitondo, Behavioral Health officer in charge assigned to the NATO Role III MMU, said bringing a therapy dog with them often helps people feel more comfortable opening up, which in turn gives the behavioral health professionals an opportunity to talk about some of the resources they can provide.





Master Sgt. Christopher Pedersen, an air refueling control team member with the 607th Air Operations Center. "Capt. Lim's ability to speak, write, and translate the concepts and ideas to promote effective mobility practices within the KAF counterparts and shared Combined Air Mobility Division was a perfect fit." Lim returned to Korea in

January 2018, this time as a uniformed member of the U.S. Air Force. His prior relationships with members of the flying community came in handy as many of the students he taught as a flight instructor were now members of the RO-KAF. Through them, he was able to establish good lines of communication between the 607th AOC and the ROK Air Mobility Reconnaissance Command.

Building these strong relationships helped strengthen the U.S. and ROK alliance, which led to joint training events designed to further the knowledge and capability of both sides. During one such event, USAF C-130J Super Hercules aircrews visited Gimhae Air Base in Busan, where they met with their ROtactics, techniques, and procedures. Another allowed RO-KAF tanker aircrews to observe a USAF KC-10 refueling mission firsthand, preparing them for operations in their own KC-330 aircraft.

if you're looking to creatively lead your team. Our CSAF is spot on to focus on inspirational leadership and culture. It's our responsibility to act within our span of control to lead in the squadron. Since taking the stick of

the mighty Double Deuce back in May, I've seen incredible front-line leaders and cultures throughout Team Travis and I've done my best to continually learn from them. Inspiration and culture, however, are not fixed and just when the team gets comfortable or feels they're at the top of their game, we must step out of our comfort zones and strive for that 1-2 percent marginal gain to improve. Otherwise, inspiration will lose its spark and culture will stagnate.

At the tactical level, culture

eats strategy for breakfast. Anyone can copy your strategy, but no one can copy your culture. Thus, culture is our strategy in building resilient and ready squadrons in the face of great-power competition with peer competitors like Russia or China. In the squadrons, we must rise to the challenge to execute Goldfein's intent. I think we're on the right track, unpacking inspirational leadership might help, but there's no doubt it's our imperative – one we have to get right.

So, how do you define inspirational leadership? There's no one way or right way to define it - there are situationalbased traits that we, as leaders. must internalize and apply in dynamic environments to lead. Can we all be inspirational leaders?
