To lead effectively, we must trust, empower

hroughout our military careers. whether long or short, we've all seen good and bad examples of leadership. One key attribute found in most effective leaders is they implicitly trust their people and they avoid "getting into the weeds" by working their subordinates' tasks for them.

This trust enables a leader to effectively communicate his or her intent, thus empowering subordinates to

own their mission and make decisions at the appropriate level. When leaders trust subordinates, deliver clear intent, and then "get out of the way," success is usually quick to follow. Recently, Air Force leaders have doubled-down on

tive involves enhancing trust and empowering commanders to make decisions at the squadron level. In turn, commanders must empower and push decisions down to Airmen. The squadron, the beating

heart of the Air Force,

will flat-line if we do not. Should the unfortunate situation arise where we do not trust our Airmen, or if we cannot clearly communicate our intent, we fall prev to the dreaded "M" word: micromanagement. This most often occurs when there is a lack

of trust or understanding between a leader and subordinate, and almost always results in frustration between both parties

To avoid the trap of micromanagement, I have found that when providing direction to subordinates, it is helpful to describe what needs to be done – that is to describe the desired end state - versus how something needs to be done. What is truly amazing is to watch the creativity and innovative solutions that arise when our Airmen are given the maneuvering airspace to problem solve. My experience has been that a well-trained, motivated Airman almost never fails to meet

expectations when the desired end state was appropriately described.

Although it is imperative to trust and empower our Airmen, with trust and empowerment comes risk. We must accept that when we empower our Airmen, we assume risk and we should not be afraid of that fact. We balance this risk and prevent mission failure through the process of oversight. Establishing oversight involves regular updates, engagement with our Airmen, and keeping important aspects of a project in our cross-check; generally speaking, the more important the project or task, the more oversight that is needed. With important projects we may need to step in for a correction, but when this occurs, we should quickly give control back to the Airmen in charge.

Simply put, oversight does not give us latitude to do our subordinates' job for them. We must let our Airmen grow through guidance, direction, leadership and oversight.

As we continue to battle an adaptive, ever-evolving enemy, trusting and empowering our Airmen will only become more important. In today's complex battlespace, and tomorrow's communication-degraded battlespace, we will fail if we fall prev to micromanagement tendencies. Fortunately, our most senior leaders are promoting an environment of trust and empowerment by revitalizing squadrons; it is up to us now to ensure that we sustain the beating heart of the Air Force by passing down this trust and empowerment to every Airman. Our success or failure depends on it.





Dual-military couple values family, service

The Leidholms are just like any ordinary young fam-

ily. They get up early each day of the week to deal with the happy chaos of getting themselves ready for work, and preparing their two small daughters for the day.

Dad and mom tag-team – he changes the baby's diaper, makes sure the 3 year old is dressed and clean, then feeds the cats and dogs. He heads out the door by 6:30 a.m.

Mom spends a few more moments nursing the 8-month-old. Then, she too, leaves to drop the kids off at daycare and get to the office. Nights and weekends are spent doing the usual stuff: housework, homework, laundry, running errands, watching television and, of course, sharing time with each other.

They are a typical American family, except for one significant difference: Staff Sgt. Kyle Leidholm, 60th Maintenance Squadron, and Staff Sgt. Nicole Leidholm, 60th Air Mobility Wing Public Affairs, serve their country in the Air Force at Travis Air Force Base, California.

Unlike most families, they know the normal routine could be dramatically interrupted at any time.

Currently, the Leidholms work a fairly normal duty day. Kyle is an aero repair technician, servicing heavylift transport aircraft at Travis. Nicole is a photojournalist and the NCO in charge of media relations. They are aware that, with the current state of world affairs, one or both of them could be deployed overseas with little notice. Like all military personnel, they are ready to put the needs of their country to blur." above all else.

Both Kyle and Nicole joined the military when college plans didn't work out. Nicole was still in technical school when the two married. Kyle was stationed at Travis and Nicole joined him soon after. The girls were quickly added to the growing family.

The military treats each member of a dual-military couple as an independent entity, despite the fact that the couple makes decisions jointly. Unfortunately, this can be problematic at times.

"Work is definitely a lot harder than it was before kids," said Kyle, "Working extended shifts and night shifts is harder. The balance of family and job tend

Nicole. "She was too young to remember. The deployments were harder on us. I deployed first in 2014 to Southwest Asia and it was a lot harder on my husband because he, all of a sudden, was a single dad."

"I also do all the finances so some of that stuff I had to keep on him to pay the bills," said Nicole. "At the time, he worked in a shop that did eight-hour days but, more often than not, those days became 12-hour days - no notice. They also worked a Panama schedule but, because I was deployed, they worked his schedule to be Monday through Friday. Thankfully, we also had a flexible childcare provider that could help us out," said Nicole.

A Panama shift is 24/7 coverage with four teams working two 12-hour shifts on a rotating pattern – two davs on, two davs off: three days on, three days off; two days on, three days off.

Childcare most notably affects the retention rate of dual-military couples. Although the RAND NDRI study shows both male and female service members perform at the same levels on the job, females are more likely to leave the military citing family responsibilities. Male service members are more likely to cite financial concerns or career opportunities.

"I'll play it enlistment by enlistment," said Kyle. "I would like to retire out of the military, but we will see how the next 14 years go."

Having supportive leadership and an understanding and flexible work environment is vital to alleviate the stressors of a dual-military family.

"It's the only thing that can make it so I can continue to serve and still be there for my kids and wife," said Kyle.





park ranger. "They provide a critical service to Point Reves. We don't have the training or authorization and it is crucial to protect the visiting public."

An example of the services Travis EOD provides to the surrounding area, is when MK2 Marine Markers, buoyant signal flares, wash up on shore to be discovered by visitors. The flares are either dropped in the ocean by aircraft or surface ships and sometimes show up in public places.

"The things that wash up have to be dealt with in a safe and appropriate manner, and Travis is very responsive and respectful to the marine mammals and everything here," said Schifsky. "There is a lot of history and relationships that have been developed."

When markers discovered, the public usually notifies park rangers in some form or another and the rangers reach out to Travis EOD.

"We'll go out to the site, do reconnaissance on it, see what kind it, is the condition of it, and if it's safe or not," said Spalding. "If it isn't, then we'll take care of it – either explosively or through some other different procedure. We'll render it safe

"We get an average of about two calls per month from the local community," said Master Sgt. Mark Walker, 60th CES EOD Operations Section Chief. "Our main calls come from Point Reyes, when markers wash ashore, and The Presidio, a former military base, when items are dug up. After these calls, the second most common is when old war trophies are discovered, such as WWII grenades.

"Usually (someone) will find some piece of ordnance, and call it in," said Spalding. "The are

"Dual and single military families can face some unique challenges," said Master Sgt. Hugh Fetla, 60th Comptroller

Fetla served as first sergeant to both of the Leidholms, who are in different squadrons. "Deployments and unaccompanied assignments can make childcare and maintaining the marriage very difficult," said Fetla. "Mission permitting, the member's leadership can work with the dual and single military families when assigning deployment cycles and work schedules. But sometimes, the mission does not allow leadership to be 100 percent accommodating. When this happens, one of the most important items the dual and single military families need to have is a FCP. This will ensure the children are taken care of during a medical emergency or period of separation."

"I think Kyle has had to use it, I've almost had to," said Nicole. "Every year, his unit recertifies the FCP. We also have to keep it updated, such as when our provider moved, we changed providers and when we had our second daughter."

With time in service, promotions and the gained experience of military life, there is an increased understanding and acceptance.

"I can see the bigger picture of what the mission needs," said Kyle. "It makes it easier to get on board with the decisions leadership makes. I wish it had been relayed to me differently when I was a younger Airman with kids."

Nicole agreed.

"We have a lot more responsibilities now as noncommissioned officers than as Airmen. Now we are taking care of people at work and at home. I guess in a way, for me, becoming a mom first, helped prepare me to be a leader."

Though the demands of dual military couples can be problematic. Kyle and Nicole's unwavering commitment to each other and to their children make it possible to readily face anv challenge.


Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.



Demonstrators also sometimes perform Canopy Relative Work in which they join their parachutes together and fly as one. Upon landing, demonstrators they will sign autographs, take pictures and answer question. and answer questions.
