Travis Airman focused on becoming RPA pilot

As Staff Sgt. Richard White talked about his childhood dreams of becoming a pilot and mentions hearing planes fly overhead, the roar of one from the Travis Air Force Base, California, flightline buzzes above us.

"It's pretty crazy to think I work on those planes now, like that one right now," he said with a smile. "That's probably where it started, just seeing these giant things in the air."

White, 60th Maintenance Group maintenance operations controller, is stepping closer to his dream. White will soon learn if he's made it through the board phase of qualification to fly remotely piloted aircraft.

White is one of several enlisted Airmen from the 60th MXG who applied to become such a pilot. The process involves several rounds of testing before reaching the phase White has. The field narrows from hundreds of applicants to more than 30 along the way.

Enlisted Airmen are being considered for the program, which is a departure from typical Air Force policy, that used to limit piloting to officers.

Other Travis maintainers who applied include Staff Sgt. Michael Richardson, Staff Sgt. Joshua Cintron Ruiz and Tech Sgt. Kyle Dedeaux. Richardson has since left for his next assignment.

Tech. Sgt. Caleb Woolman, 60th MXG maintenance operations controller assistant section chief and White's immediate supervisor, said after taking the test, White, Cintron Ruiz, Dedeaux and Richardson came back to the shop discussing the differences in the test and compared notes.

Program helps members get healthy

He gained 30 pounds during his wife's first pregnancy. He lost 20 and was working on the last 10 pounds when he learned at Christmas that his wife is pregnant with their second child.

This time around, Staff Sgt. Randall Loeschner, 60th Inpatient Operations Squadron, has a plan to stay on track despite having "pregnant foods like pizza in the house."

Loeschner is enrolled in the "Better Body Better Life" program offered by the nutritional medicine clinic at David Grant USAF Medical Center at Travis Air Force Base, California.

Following a recent class, Loeschner explained that he already knew "a lot about nutrition," but is finding that's not the case with some Airmen he works with as a unit physical training leader.

"They didn't grow up with this (information). They don't know what is a 'good fat' or what foods are considered proteins," said Loeschner.

One of the most important elements of the BBBL program is learning to set smart goals.

"They force me to look at the way I'm eating and hold myself to those standards," said Loeschner.

BBBL is a hands-on five week series focusing on nutrition, physical activity and behavioral issues that promote healthy living. Classes can be taken in order or as a participant's schedule allows.

"The purpose of this program is to help people change their whole lifestyle," said Capt. Jeffery Perry, 60th Diagnostics and Therapeutics Squadron chief of outpatient nutrition.

BBBL participants identify personal goals and devise plans to meet them. Perry said he's watched some participants go from being disorganized to preparing meals ahead of time and from being inactive to exercising daily.

Participants get weighed and measured at the beginning of each class although the goal for some participants isn't

Classes are small (eight to 10 students) so participants have time to interact with one another and share their successes and failures.

"We provide a lot of information about changing behaviors, like looking at portion sizes," said Senior Airman Bryan Metcalfe, 60th MDTS. As a ry said. BBBL instructor, Metcalfe also covers topics such as nutrient dense foods, emotional eating, dining out and reduc-

"We talk about different types of activities and how to set up a regimen," Perry said. "We encourage people to use the fitness resources available at the fitness center and to discuss with their doctor any health concerns before attempting any strenuous physical activity program."

BBBL classes are held from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesdays and from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Thursdays. The program is open to all Tricare beneficiaries.

Active-duty members who sign up at the Airman and Family Readiness Center website can earn five Leadership Pathways credits when they complete the program, Per-

Air Force buys next lot of Pegasus tankers

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio — The Air Force has awarded a \$2.1 billion contract to Boeing for on contract and moving them the third Low Rate Initial Production lot of KC-46A Pegasus

This award includes 15 aircraft and associated spare parts. The first two production lots for seven and 12 aircraft respectively were awarded in August 2016. This award brings the total number of tankers purchased by

"This program is moving forward at a steady rate," said Brig. Gen. Duke Z. Richardson, the program executive officer for tankers. "We are getting aircraft down the production line, meeting test requirements, and preparing for 'iron on the ramp'."

The first aircraft delivery is scheduled for McConnell Air Force Base, Kansas, which is the first active-duty Air Force operating location for the Pegasus. That delivery will be followed by



SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. — United States and Coalition forces in Afghanistan are working to advise, train and assist Afghan security forces across the country. At places like Jalalabad Airfield in the country's far-eastern Nangarhar Province, they recently called for a shipment of vehicles to support their ongoing work with their Afghan part-

Getting those much-needed vehicles came with a catch.

Jalalabad Airfield's runway is so narrow, the C-130 and C-17 Globemaster IIIs are the only AMC aircraft that can land at the airfield. Because of the requirement to bring in multiple vehicles on each sortie, the C-17 was required and they would have to back up and take off in the same direction they flew in.

The aircraft would also have to land in the middle of the night and take off again before the sun rose.



Pararescueman awarded Air Force Cross for valor

17-hour battle on an Afghan mountaintop, a pararescueman's extraordinary heroism was recognized with an Air wide review of medals awarded since 9/11.

Then-Tech. Sgt. Keary Miller - against overwhelming odds and a barrage of heavy fire from al-Oaeda militants dashed through deep snow into the line of fire multiple times to assess and care for critically wounded U.S. service members. March 4, 2002.

Miller was previously awarded the Silver Star medal for these actions, Nov. 1, 2003. The Air Force Cross is the service's highest combat medal for valor, second only to the Medal

Miller was deployed from the 123rd Special Tactics Squadron, an Air National Guard unit based in Standiford, Kentucky. During the mission, he was the Air Force combat search and rescue team leader assigned to a U.S Army Ranger quick reaction force.



"I saw Keary taking action on the wounded, worried about collecting the casualties and triaging them," Brown said, who was in charge of aircraft communications and precision strike. "He was careful in his thoughts and actions, conducting himself casualty information to me all morning.

As the battle continued, Miller collected ammunition from the deceased to distribute it to Rangers face down. Keary and multiple positions in need of I were deep in the aircraft – and ammo, moving through heavy enemy fire each time. "I was listening to the updates

as they were coming in; I was so proud because my friends were on that mountain and their future was so uncertain but they were rocking it - they were doing everything right," Mclane said, who was listening to realtime satellite communications of the battle. "It's like, these guvs might not make it off this mountain, but by God, they're going down swinging.'

vital to the Air Force's efforts to combat terrorism in the Middle East. Those efforts range from Syria and Iraq to Afghanistan.

"The mission these Airmen do and the contributions they make are huge in the effort to win the war against Daesh while helping our partners build capacity providing security in their own countries," said Lt. Gen. Sam Cox, 18th Air Force commander. "What they do saves lives, every day, by making sure the right cargo and passengers get where they need to safely and on time."

Although there are multiple mobility forces assigned to AFCENT, the 816th EAS is one of the closest 18th AF assigned units supporting the fight in Iraq and Syria. As the only expeditionary squadron directly reporting to 18th AF, it draws on aircrews and maintainers from every C-17 unit to provide theater-direct delivery to the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility.

Put simply, the 816th EAS moves stuff.

And as the squadron's commander, Lt. Col. Steve Anderson, notes, they move a lot of stuff.

"We provide professional around so and safe combat airlift, bringing massive amounts of bullets. gion face.

bombs, food, water, construction materials, vehicles, passengers, helicopters and other items to the U.S. and Coalition forces via air-land or airdrop mission sets," he said. "We fly multiple sorties a day, 365 days a year."

In 2016, the squadron flew more than 2,400 missions, moving nearly 102,000 tons of cargo and almost 120,000 passengers.

Capt. Andrew Stitt, a C-17 pilot deployed from Joint Base Charleston, South Carolina, said the capabilities the squadron brings to the fight make the unit essential to U.S. Central Command's operations.

"Some of the places where Coalition forces are located are landlocked and do not have channels to obtain the necessary supplies that they need to fight in their region," Stitt said. "Because we are able to go into those countries with a minimum amount of risk, we are able to directly deliver and fulfill a need for forces to sustain operations."


