# **Travis backs FEMA** in flood relief effort

Due to historical rainfall and flooding across Northern California. Travis Air Force Base. California, is supporting an incident management assistance team from the Federal Emergency Management Agency with a staging area at the base.

In conjunction with FEMA, Air Forces Northern and U.S. Northern Command determined Travis was best suited to support a FEMA Incident Support Base to provide relief to communities affected by a potential Oroville Auxiliary Spillway failure, said Master Sgt. Joe Brockman, 60th Civil Engineer Squadron Readiness and Emergency Management superintendent.

With 44 trucks and approximately 30 personnel, the IMAT brought cots, drinking water, blankets, meals, medical equipment and supplies.

The team began arriving Feb. 13 at Travis.

"It was apparent there could be significant impacts," said Victor Inge, FEMA external affairs officer. "We were in touch with the state and deployed the

IMAT. During incidents such as this, we lean forward by prepositioning commodities in the event there is a need."

Travis is supporting the ISB by providing space, safety, security and communications assistance, said Brockman.

"Once the order came down, every squadron in the 60th Mission Support Group collaborated, ensuring the ISB setup was smooth and efficient," said Brockman.

The 60th CES Emergency Management flight coordinated with wing leadership and regional emergency preparedness liaison officers to determine a suitable staging location for the ISB capable of supporting 300 tractor trailers and administrative space for FEMA personnel.

"The 60th Aerial Port Squadron provided a staging area for the ISB and kept wing leadership informed of the latest developments by monitoring and managing logistics requirements, the flow of personnel and requests for CES support," said Brockman. "Additionally, the 60th Communications Squadron ensured the IMAT

# Team surveys for potentially endangered species

What do the western spadefoot toad, northwestern pond turtle and tricolored blackbird have in common? All could live on Travis Air Force Base, California, and all could become federally listed under the Endangered Species Act.

A project team from the Center for Integrated Research on the Environment at the University of Montana is surveying several areas on base for the toad, including the former aero club, Union Creek south of the Navy detachment and the Castle Terrace conservation area.

The team also is surveying areas where the turtle and blackbird were previously sited, said Kirsten Christopherson, wildlife biologist with the Air Force Civil Engineer Center Installation Support Team at Travis.

Through a cooperative agreement between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the CIRE, the Air Force awarded federally-listed species surveys at multiple bases nationwide, including Travis and Beale AFB, California.

"By doing habitat assessments and surveys for these species now, the Air Force is posturing to adjust to any new legal requirements associated with those species and thereby, minimize delays in the base's future construction projects," said Christopherson.

Christopherson explained that the Endangered Species Act requires federal agencies to consult with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service or National Marine Fisheries Service to ensure any project "they approve, fund, or carry out will not jeopardize the continued existence of a listed species, or destroy or adversely modify designated critical habitats.'

California already lists the western spadefoot toad and the northwestern pond turtle as species of concern. The state lists the tricolored blackbird as a "candidate" species, meaning it will be added to the state's threatened and endangered species list in the future.

The western spadefoot toad

has been found in California's central valley and coastal ranges as well as the coastal lowlands from the San Francisco Bay south to Mexico. Although they are primarily terrestrial. they require aquatic habitats for breeding.

The pond turtle has been split into two subspecies, one that prefers the northern region – from the Bay Area into Washington – and one that is restricted to the central coast range south of the Bay Area. Primarily an aquatic animal, the turtle requires terrestrial habitat in the winter and for reproduc-

The tricolored blackbird spends the winter in the Sacramento to San Joaquin River delta and along the coast. The largest population is located in the central valley and surrounding foothills though they have been

seen as far north as Oregon and as far east as Nevada.

"We want to find out where these species are, record their numbers and determine their habitat characteristics," said Winsor Lowe, CIRE project principal investigator and associate professor of amphibious reptiles. Lowe and two other project leads met with Air Force project managers at Travis in November 2016 to review the work plan and schedule sur-

When they visited in January, the team conducted aquatic surveys for the toad, which involved visual scans of pool surfaces for egg clusters. They also installed song meters at several locations, including the duck pond, to detect nighttime toad

The team returned Feb. 13 to download the song meter data

and collect water samples. The water will be filtered, dried and stored until funds are available for "species specific primers" that allow the toad's DNA to be detected and sequenced, said Penn Craig, 60th Civil Engineer Squadron biological scientist and natural and cultural resource manager.

"Currently, primers are not available for this species and species-specific primers are expensive," said Craig.

The team plans to return in corporated into the next update April to set hoop traps for the pond turtle.

"A tube allows the turtle to enter (the trap) but a door shuts so it can't get out. Part of the submersible trap sticks out of the water so the turtles don't drown," said Brett Addis, team field coordinator.

In April, the team also will conduct blackbird surveys.

The birds breed from March to early August, said Craig. Although there can be as many as 200,000 blackbirds in a colonv. fewer than 2.000 have been

The project team is expected to complete all field work by May, according to Christopher-

"We expect to receive a draft report in August and then finalize the report by December. The final results will then be inof the Travis AFB Integrated Natural Resources Management Plan. # **Blended Retirement System training now** available for Airmen

The Department of Defense is scheduled to kick off a new military retirement program beginning Jan. 1, 2018.

The Blended Retirement System provides military members with matching government contributions to personal Thrift Savings Plans, the receipt of a continuation bonus at 12 years of service, and pension payment options, in exchange for a reduced retirement pension.

Those serving prior to Jan. 1, 2018, will be grandfathered in to the legacy retirement program. Members with less than 12 years of service or 4,320 retirement points as of Dec. 31 can opt to participate in the

BRS at any time between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 2018, without the initial 60 day waiting period. Individuals entering active duty service on or after Jan. 1. 2018, will be automatically enrolled in the BRS.

'The BRS provides a more diversified and portable retirement benefit for an estimated 85 percent of members," said Betsy Ratashak-Vogel, 60th Force Support Squadron personal financial readiness program manager and a certified financial planner. "Only about one in five members serve long enough to receive retirement benefits under the current legacv retirement system."

Service members who do not serve a full 20 years still have a benefit to take with them, said Ratashak-Vogel.



ix years and four months ago, I married my husband. I was 19 and completely ignorant to the commitment I just made.

Dual military marriages make up just over 11 percent of the Air Force population and, like many dual couples, we were stationed apart. Less than a year after requesting join-spouse orders, he was assigned 16 miles from me.

A few words and glares were exchanged. Then, the kettle of macaroni made its way out the front door and across the lawn. As it flew

through the air, it spewed its contents like tears of cheesy sadness. This was not my proudest moment.

No one really talks about their arguments or maybe they do and I just never listened. Nobody mentioned staying away from food that you are passionate about unless you are willing to accept change.

I am naturally averse to change and a food enthusiast, so this advice would have been welcomed. The initial transition period, though painful at times, was merely a flash that we now look back on with joyful reminiscence.

# **AF, Navy** team up for tower

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE. Fla. — The Air Force is constantly looking for innovative ideas and solutions to save money and resources, and this effort recently paid off by utilizing a sister service asset to create a huge cost saving solution.

The 53rd Weapons Evaluation Group teamed up with the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Naval Support Activity Panama City, to utilize the Navy's recently-built communications tower to replace the 53rd WEG's unserviceable and outdated Gulf Range Drone Control System tower. These towers are essential for triangulating communications for controlling unmanned drones over the Gulf of Mexico.

This innovative investment took approximately one year to accomplish and will save hundreds of thousands of taxpayer

"We identified an impending shortfall and we sought innovative solutions," said Col. Lance Wilkins, the 53rd Weapons Evaluation Group commander. "By doing that, instead of buying a new tower outright, we were able to take an innovative idea and free up time, money and resources that can be better utilized elsewhere."

Constructing a new tower would have cost an estimated \$700,000, and leasing a commercial tower would cost approximately \$9,000 annually.

Due to good relationships with the Navy, the 53rd WEG was able to avoid a potential mission failure by using assets already in place.

"Our tower is over 50 years old," said Capt. Katie Johnson, the 53rd Test Support Squadron director of engineering. "If anything were to happen to that tower or our antennas on it, we wouldn't be able to conduct our critical Weapon System

# Airman rebounding after aneurysm

FORT GEORGE G. MEADE, Md. — Early on Dec. 9, 2015, Staff Sgt. Rasheed, a 7th Intelligence Squadron signals intelligence analyst, experienced a cerebral aneurysm. From what he can recall, and what he has been told, a neighbor found him unresponsive in his Maryland apartment while his dog ran loose outside, door wide open.

Right away, Rasheed's family was notified and they rushed to be by his side at the University of Maryland Medical Center's Neurological Intensive Care Unit in Baltimore.

would find him in when they arrived.

"I was getting ready to go to lunch and kept getting a recurring call," Rasheed's mother, Debra, said. "The police informed me first, so I called my husband, and we got right on the road with no hesitation."

At the hospital, Rasheed remained in an unresponsive state for several hours, with no cerebral functions, and the neurosurgeons believed he might not survive the next few days.

Then, suddenly, five days later. Rasheed awoke and began to show responsiveness.

His recovery has been long, but his support system has been strong.

After three months at UMMC, and with the help of his mother and his squadron, When they left home, they were Rasheed was transferred to

uncertain what condition they Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda for his recovery.

Because of the aneurysm. Rasheed is currently unable to perform his job, but that has not stopped him from working hard to return to the 7th IS.

"I haven't been to work exactly, I still do rehab and many things throughout the day to get back on track," Rasheed said.

During rehabilitation, Rasheed works on cognitive skills exercises, and goes to cooking classes, physical therapy and speech classes. Those are the things he will need to accomplish to get back to work. he said.

While he concentrates on his part, the Airmen of the 7th IS are working on their end to get the 'morale monitor' back to where he thrives, with them.

# Sergeant turns personal tragedy into therapy

BUCKLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Colo. — Following the unexpected death of her youngest son. Jeremiah, she became reckless. She was drinking daily and didn't care whether she lived or died.

It took a failed suicide attempt and court-ordered therapy for her life to change.

When Tech. Sgt. Amee Espinoza decided to end her feelings of hopelessness, she put her older son Isaiah to bed, kissed him, and then swallowed a handful of valium. At the moment before sliding into unconsciousness, she felt something other than helplessness - regret. The last thing she remembers is screaming.

When the survivor and now mother of two awoke, she was in a hospital bed. Espinoza told the nurses of her experience and was admitted into a mental institution. She spent two weeks in inpatient care and was courtordered to seek outpatient therapy upon her release.

The court order saved her life and unearthed a calling in her to serve others through

"I was depressed, hurt, and didn't want to be around anvone, especially a therapist," Espinoza said. "At that time, I was unsure if I was going to attempt suicide again. But, I knew deep down that I didn't want to die. I didn't want my son's last memory of me to be his mom being carried away in a stretcher."

According to Espinoza, it took several sessions for her to begin to "believe" in her therapy. After a couple months she started to look forward to her sessions and eventually her thoughts shifted to the positive. Once she was successfully discharged from the court-ordered therapy, Espinoza started attending support group meetings for bereaved parents. A year later, she was facilitating the group sessions and acting as a victim advocate.

She realized she had a greater purpose in life.

"I knew that my purpose was to use my experience to help others overcome trauma," she said. "I didn't feel lonely when I was surrounded by group members. It was an amazing experience, so I decided to enroll in

# US, UK work together to save stranded crew

MILDENHALL, England — Imagine this: You're on a vacht traveling from country to country. Five days into traveling, a rogue wave hits the boat, dragging its mast into the water and snapping it; leaving you stranded at sea.

For 14 people this scenario was their reality Feb. 9 when the Clyde Challenger, a 60foot racing yacht, was traveling from the Azores heading toward the U.K. when disaster struck. The vacht and those aboard were stranded hundreds of miles from land, awaiting rescue.

Her Majesty's Coastguard picked up the emergency beacon alert that was sent out by the crew of the stranded yacht. The HMS Dragon, a Royal Navy warship, was then diverted to the rescue.

"While working, I received notice from the command post controller, advising me that the ROYAL AIR FORCE U.K. coast guard was in search of assistance," said Tech. Sgt. Ryan Clauss, the 100th Operation Support Squadron NCO in charge of wing scheduling. "I received notice from leadership requesting our KC-135 Stratotankers to provide communications to relay from the vessel to the U.K. rescue."


This is the point where partnerships came into play. The tanker departed from Royal Air Force Mildenhall, joining the rescue efforts by providing overhead surveillance and communication support. Although CV-22 Ospreys from the 352nd Special Operations Wing were dispatched as a long-range rescue option, it wasn't possible due to the weather.



SOUTHWEST ASIA — Airmen assigned to the 332nd Air Expeditionary Wing take great pride in the heritage created for them by the Tuskegee Airmen.

Today a key piece of the wing's history has once again returned to its flightline.

The legacy of the Tuskegee Airmen was born in Montgomery, Alabama, when the Tuskegee Institute's application to conduct civilian pilot training was approved by the Civil Aeronautics Administration in the fall

About one year later President Franklin D. Roosevelt's administration announced the Army Air Corps would begin training black military pilots, and the place to do it was Tuskegee, Alabama.

So began the storied history of the Tuskegee Airmen. Flying their P-51 Mustangs, with tails painted bright red, the Airmen fought valiantly through World War II under the crest of the 332nd Fighter Group.

Now more than 75 years later, a red-tailed fighter jet from Montgomery again flies with the 332nd.

they told me that they flew overhead of the distressed vessel and talked with them on the radio throughout the duration they were there," Clauss said. "When they first arrived they were talking more often to the crew onboard the vessel, but due to limited battery life of the radio, they began communicating every 30 minutes."

Other vessels made multiple attempts to rescue the stranded crew, however, the weather conditions prohibited a safe rescue. The crew was eventually rescued after the HMS Dragon arrived on scene Feb. 11, after traveling 20 hours through the raging seas. All 14 crewmembers were rescued and brought aboard the ship, given medical attention and food.

"Unexpected life-saving opportunities like this one illustrate the importance of partnership training and the relationships behind those activities," said Col. Thomas Torkelson, the 100th Air Refueling Wing commander.





important, Labrecque said. On the Reserve side, whenever Airmen are deployed, it takes time to get spun up on regular Air Force processes.

"This integration will help cut down on that time," she added. "These are the systems they will be working on when they deploy."

Both Reservists and active duty will learn the other's systems, Henigin continued.

"Our plan is for customers to have no idea whether they are being aided by a Reservist or active duty because that's irrelevant," Henigin said. "This will save time for our customers and increase proficiency for our Airmen.'

The transition will also be helpful for those who find themselves with new coworkers.

"It's good for our active-duty Airmen to understand the differences between the statuses of Reservists," Henigin explained. "It allows for them to be better informed, and can enhance continuum of service for these Airmen if they decide to

separate from active duty." A lot of Reservists have been

in the Force Support career fields for a long time, said Johnson. They bring years of experience and knowledge on the systems and processes. There is stability that comes from having Citizen Airmen embedded with active duty because they create continuity, when there is turn over on the active duty side.

"They are the anchor for a quicker battle rhythm," she

The commanders expect that the traditional Reservist personnel specialists will benefit from jumping into this new environment on annual tour.

"I think the vitality of the young Airmen will invigorate the Reservists when they come in," Labrecque said. "We expect this to be a huge morale booster.'

In the end, it was clear that we were not together because of our specific commonalities. but because we enjoyed experiencing each other. It was a simple revelation made in a critical time.



effort to step away from my desk to spend time with my Airmen in their workcenters. This time, though beneficial, can be less personable than the one-on-one time at 39,000 feet, but nonetheless, important.

I posed the question, "Did I take advantage of every opportunity to mentor my Airmen?" For the most part, I believe I did. Looking back though, I realize that I sometimes found myself so focused and on task that I failed to take in the world around me. Walking the halls with tunnel vision from work

center to work center, I may have appeared unapproachable. Maybe you can relate, maybe not, but for me, I have had some significant conversations in the hallways of the squadron.

The TSP, including all DoD contributions, are the separating member's to keep.

Additionally, individuals who retire with the BRS can choose a lump sum option where they collect partial payment upfront and receive the remainder of their pension in monthly installments.

When a new service member has served for 60 days, the DoD will begin matching investments by up to one percent of their base pay. After two years of service, the DoD will increase contributions by up to four percent of their base pay. The government will continue

member separates, retires or hits 26 years of service.

Eligible service members interested in enrolling in the BRS must first complete the Joint Knowledge Online Opt-in Course and the registration process through MvPav between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 2018. Once an individual is enrolled in the BRS, he or she cannot reverse the process.

The BRS is not retroactive. If a current TSP member chooses to participate, the DoD will begin matching TSP contributions the following pay period.

Those choosing to not participate in the BRS must still complete the JKO Opt-in Course.
