571st MSAS provides training to Colombia

571ST MOBILITY SUPPORT ADVISORY SQUADRON

Airmen from the 571st Mobility Support Advisory Squadron worked with the Colombian armed forces as part of a mobile training team from Feb. 11 through March 11 at two air bases in Colombia.

The team consisted of 15 air advisors from the 571st MSAS at Travis Air Force Base and six Total Force instructors from three other U.S. Air Force units. The training covered a variety of areas of cooperation between the U.S. and Colombia. It aimed at supporting Colombia in their pursuit to counter transnational and transregional threat networks and to enhance the capability of the Fuerza Aérea Colombiana. their air force or, FAC, to maintain regional security through increased proficiency in mobility support operations.

The training was conducted at Comando Aereo de Transporte Militar in Bogota, Colombia, and Comando Aereo Combate-1 in Palanquero, Colombia. The training topics focused on C-130 Hercules aircraft maintenance, aerial firefighting procedures, search and rescue, intelligence and medical intelligence.

The C-130s, located at Comando Aereo de Transporte Militar, are the workhorse of the FAC fleet, capable of conducting a diverse mission set. Throughout the engagement, 571st MSAS maintenance air advisors worked with the FAC to develop their maintenance philosophy, systems knowledge, and best practices and procedures. A heavy focus was placed on the C-130 engine, hydraulic, fuel, environmental and electrical system familiarization and troubleshooting.

Instructors conducted training through classroom briefings and hands-on training on the aircraft, to gain a thorough understanding of Colombian air force maintenance prac-

Cruise ship travelers released

As of April 1, all 850 Grand Princess passengers have completed their quarantine and departed Travis Air Force Base.

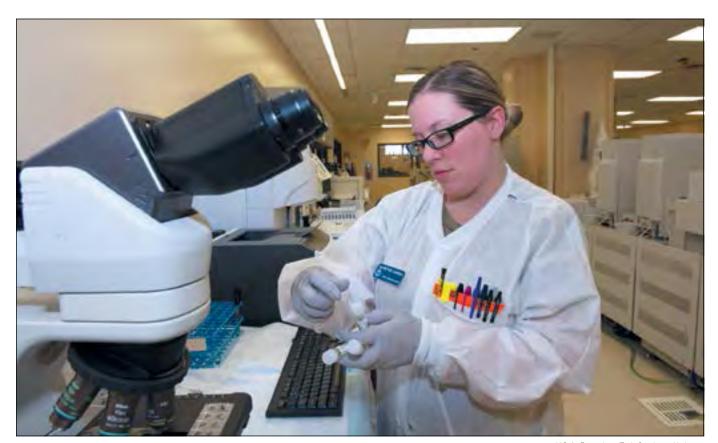
The passengers arrived March 9 at Travis, where they received daily screening for Covid-19 symptoms, basic medical care for other health conditions, meals, quarantine-appropriate activities, and transportation to their final destinations, all by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Each person was also offered Covid-19 testing. Those passengers who tested positive were transferred to non-military facilities overseen by federal medical staff, and those passengers who developed acute symptoms were transferred to area hospitals.

"We can't overstate how much the cooperation and engagement of our federal, state, and local partners helped us meet this enormous challenge. Supporting the quarantine for these passengers assisted in slowing the spread of Covid-19 and with protecting the American public," said Dr. Robert Kadlec, HHS assistant secretary for Preparedness and Response. "A tremendous thank you goes to DoD and their outstanding staff at each installation. We are also grateful for the support received from local hospitals where seriously ill passengers were treated, as well as the health care providers who took care of them."

Agencies from across the U.S. government provided staff and resources to ensure the health, safety, and comfort of the Grand Princess cruise ship passengers. In addition to HHS

Col. Jeffrey Nelson, 60th Air Mobility Wing commander, placed the base in Health Protection Condition Charlie March 18, restricted gatherings on base to fewer than 10 people and limited active-duty Airmen to traveling no more than 150 miles due to the growing spread of Covid-19 in the communities surrounding the base.

The pandemic has also impacted how the medical staff at DGMC provides care, said Beals.

"Routine, outpatient and elective surgeries have been curtailed, and we are leveraging telehealth options to the maximum extent possible," she said. "This enables

Additionally, Team Travis our provider teams in the clinics, who are not currently seeing patients face-to-face due to physical distancing, to handle visits over the phone. That's something we want to continue as Solano County. California, and the president may extend physical distancing measures."

President Donald Trump extended physical distancing guidelines through April 30 during a press conference March 29. The president also said he would assess the situation at the end of April, but that physical distancing measures could be implemented until June.

ARLINGTON, Va. — In a significant step that enhances the U.S. Space Force's capabilities and development, the Department of the Air Force has identified 23 U.S. Air Force organizations whose space-related missions will soon transfer to the Space Force.

Secretary of the Air Force Barbara Barrett, in conjunction with Chief of Space Operations Gen. John "Jay" Raymond and Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. David Goldfein, directed the transfer which entails shifting space missions from Air Force organizations into the newest military branch.

Currently, Space Force is comprised primarily of units which previously fell under the former Air Force Space Command prior to the service's establishment on Dec. 20, 2019.

According to Space Force officials, the goal is to have each of the 23 space missions formally transferred from the Air Force into the Space Force within the next three to six months based on timing and conditions specific to each organization and mission. The CSAF and CSO have been delegated the authority to actually execute the transfer when they jointly agree the necessary conditions have been met to affect a smooth transfer.

The following locations have been identified for a transfer action. An asterisk indicates a partial mission transfer, such as the size of a flight, branch or division:

- 17th Test Squadron, Peterson Air Force Base, Colorado.
- 18th Intel Squadron, Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.

BMT takes steps to protect trainers

JOINT BASE SAN ANTO-NIO-LACKLAND, Texas - To help slow the spread of Covid-19 while accomplishing the mission of turning civilians into mission-ready Airmen, Air Force basic military training has implemented layers of protective measures to mitigate the risk of spreading the virus within the BMT pipeline.

Specific mitigation measures that have been implemented across BMT include implementation of a 14-day restriction of movement upon arrival, as well as social distancing, symptom monitoring and increased sanitation.

"We must balance the need to fuel the greatest Air and Space Force in the world with ready and able Airmen while caring for our trainees, military training instructors and their families," said Chief Master Sgt. Stefan Blazier, 37th Training Wing command chief. "This is a dynamic and constantly evolving situation, but what we won't do is watch from the sidelines. Our BMT team and leaders across the Gateway Wing will continue to implement protective measures to ensure the safety of our number one priority – America's sons and daughters - our Airmen - our team.'

YOKOTA AIR BASE, Japan — For the first time, Yokota Air Base personnel conducted a C-130J Super Hercules assault landing on the Foxtrot taxiway March 26.

Foxtrot taxiway was originally used for the legacy C-130H models from 1991 to 2001. Since then, Yokota AB's airlifters have used the permanently painted hard surface on the main runway.

The taxiway was brought out of retirement and repurposed for this exercise as a landing zone, or LZ, which is an area designated to land in lieu of a runway. Oftentimes, C-130s use LZs downrange to resupply front-line troops who may be in an area where a runway is not available or accessible.

This training is conducted to guarantee the airfield team is ready to perform skilled landings on short, narrow, crowded and even unmarked strips of land.

Aircraft do not land on a temporarily established runway by themselves and, because of this, the training is not just for the C-130J aircrew, but it is also for the entire team running operations on

"It was really a group effort to make

this exercise a success and it was great to see us all work so well together," said 1st Lt. Aaron Church, 374th Operations Support Squadron airfield operations of-

The 374th OSS Airfield Operations Flight encompasses air traffic controllers, airfield management Airmen, and radar and airfield weather systems technicians, who perform different essential skill-sets, but work as one to operate the airfield and airspace at Yokota AB.

"Measuring out and marking a LZ would normally be an airfield management task; and clearing a C-130 to land would be an ATC task," Church said. "Here at Yokota (AB), the 374th OSS is training all three essential skill sets to be able do either task, if required."

The shift in training methodology is in support of Pacific Air Forces' Agile Combat Employment concept.

"PACAF has given us a basic concept of operations and a goal to make ACE a reality." Church said. "We are developing how to train, equip our Airmen and operate from the ground up."

The airfield operations flight is pioneering what it looks like to train for ACE by cross-training their career fields and enabling C-130J aircrews to be assault landing-capable.

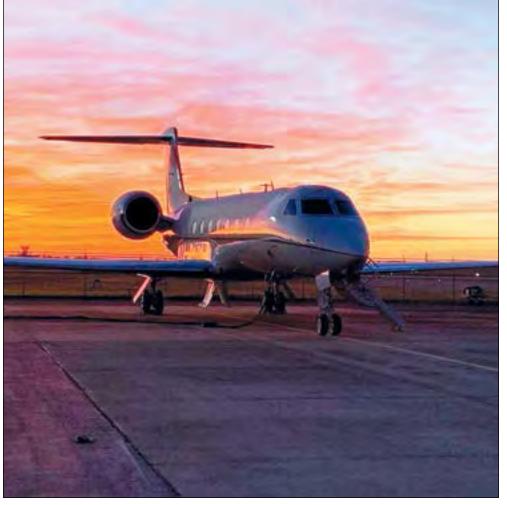

Embedded within the order are mechanisms by which exceptions can be granted. Authorized exceptions to the order in-

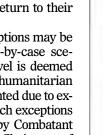

Additional exceptions may be granted on a case-by-case scenario in which travel is deemed mission essential, humanitarian in nature or warranted due to extreme hardship. Over a five-day period from March 16-20, the Flight Medicine Clinic completed 93 PHAs, 31 annual flight PHAs and processed 20 medical clearances.
