During contingencies, things that are normally easy to find can be a challenge, said Abbate.

"Many stores in Florida were closed because of the damage," said Abbate. "So, we had to be creative. Some things had to be flown in from other states or regions in order to get what we needed."

TRANSCOM brings home Americans

SCOTT AIFR FORCE BASE. Ill. — Since its formation on March 27, the U.S. Transportation Command's Repatriation Coordination Cell organized the stateside return of more than 3.900 Americans stranded abroad due to tightened COVID-19 travel limitations imposed by numerous countries.

Supporting the Department of State's efforts to bring American citizens home as the pandemic spread across the globe, the USTRANSCOM unit, which stood down in mid-May, contracted 14 separate commercial charter airlift missions. transporting many thousands back to the U.S. from five different African and Asian nations.

The process to achieve these repatriations began with the command's Repat Coord Cell receiving a request from DOS' Repatriation Task Force. Following validation of DOS' requirement, they verified the number of passengers and provided the information to USTRANSCOM's

During the workweek, the Repat Coord Cell normally operated from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m., but also executed its duties on the weekend, when required. To ensure unity of effort, they participated in two daily teleconferences – morning and afternoon - with DOS' Transportation Cell and attended another midday phone session with USTRANSCOM. A majority of the Repat Coord Cell's primary participants also continued to serve in their regular jobs, and in this capacity, they provided the expertise and experience for the command's assistance to DOS.

"USTRANSCOM's Repat Coord Cell quickly formed with command and AMC professionals who provided DOS with responsive commercial airlift supporting movement from different parts of the globe," stated U.S. Air Force Maj. Christopher Moyano, Commercial Industry Branch, US-TRANSCOM's Operations Directorate. "The combined efforts of USTRANSCOM. AMC, DOS, and commercial industry saw the safe return of over 3.900 Americans on chartered airlift,

Defense launches effort to collect COVID-19 convalescent plasma

Patients who have recovered from COVID-19 may hold treatment in their veins that could help others who are critically ill with the respiratory infection.

The Department of Defense has begun an effort to collect 8,000 donated units of plasma from patients who have recovered from COVID-19 to support the development of an effective treatment against the disease.

"We may want to ask you to stick your arm out and donate blood," Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Gen. Mark Milley said in a May 28 virtual town hall. "What that can then do is help others who are severely ill, and if we can do that, then we'll be on a good path toward getting some really powerful therapeutics."

Donations will be accepted at 15 Armed Services Blood Program centers across the lescent plasma donor, said Army



Experts address COVID-19 effects on mental health

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed how people live, interact and cope with new stressors. However, military psychological health experts emphasize making small changes to address problems

"Aside from worrying about the contracting the virus, we worry about the many ways it impacts our lives and for how long," said Dr. Holly O'Reilly, clinical psychologist at the Defense Health Agency's Psychological Health Center of Excellence. "Taking small steps to address problems early on can make a big difference, especially during the current pan-

O'Reilly and three other Department of Defense experts on psychological health discussed the mental health effects of COVID-19 and tools to address them during a media panel May 27 as part of May's national Mental Health Awareness Month observance. Each year, the Military Health System joins the nation to raise awareness of psychological health concerns. This year's MHS theme of "Need a Little

because "sometimes a little bit of help is all we need to improve our mental health and stav mission ready," O'Reilly said.

O'Reilly says that one of those small steps is to "bright side" anxieties during the pandemic. "Instead of catastrophizing and imagining that this will be terrible forever, take a step back and think about how you will successfully navigate this situation, even though it's difficult." she said.

For example, bright siding can help health care workers with the growing anxiety they may feel due to the ambiguity of the novel coronavirus and limited medical knowledge of its impacts. Dr. Stephen Cozza, associate director of the Center for the Study of Traumatic Stress at the Uniformed Services University for Health Sciences, encouraged senior clinicians and medical leaders to frame expectations for their workers and help them understand the limits of what they can do in the challenging environment that COVID-19 presents

This also extends to families of health care workers. "Many of the families of health care workers are both faced by long See MENTAL Page 12



EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE. Fla. — Those common, vibrating "thwip" helicopter sounds arrived well before they showed up, as 413th Flight Test Squadron personnel turned to look to the north at Eglin Air Force Base, May 19.

Seconds later, two helicopters appeared and the sounds and vibrations intensified. The Air Force's newest combat search and rescue helicopter, the HH-60W Jolly Green II, led the way down the Duke Field runway. It was followed by the Army's multi-role combat helicopter, the AH-64 Apache.

The two aircraft landed at Eglin AFB completing their first flight and combined test mission together.

The Apache, from Redstone Army Test Center, Alabama, flew in for system testing with the HH-60W.

JOINT BASE MCGUIRE-DIX-LAKEHURST, N.J. — Two Airmen from the 621st Contingency Response Wing have supported the Department of Defense's effort to combat COVID-19 since March.

Lt. Col. Curt Haase and Master Sgt. John Huck, from Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey, have been embedded with the 64th Air Expeditionary Group to help bring Air Force Reservists into the fight against the pandemic.

Huck has been the lead for the four-person personnel support for contingency operations team of Airmen from across the team, made up of Reservists U.S., from 29 different wings, from New Jersey and Pennsylvania, as they processed a total of nearly 300 Airmen from various units across the United States within the last eight weeks. The majority of the Air Force's personnel contributing to the COVID fight have been medical professionals to include doctors, medics, nurses, respiratory technicians and behavioral health experts, according to Huck.

"My job is just to get them where they need to be," said Huck. "Right now, they're going into the thick of things and dealing with some very sick patients."

The Airmen, working in tandem with the Army's 44th Medical Brigade, have been supporting U.S. Northern Command, which remains commit-

support to the Federal Emergency Management Agency for the whole-of-nation COVID-19 response.

"I have a newfound respect for Reservists and medical professionals," said Haase, the 64th AEG deputy commander and the 621st Mobility Support Operations Squadron commander. "They have been fearless and incredibly adaptive since they've arrived.'

Haase, currently working out of a hotel in Manhattan, is providing the command and control function to ensure the health and welfare of the Airmen working in the AEG.

"This has been an incredible opportunity for me to see this come together and get after it," said Haase.

Hospitals in the northeast were tasked to manage increased patient populations despite staff shortages due to illnesses.

"Some of the hospitals were down to 60 percent manning," said Haase. "These Airmen had

Despite the efforts of the AEG medics, many patients they cared for were not able to recover from coronavirus.

"The stress put on these Airmen day in and day out is unbelievable," said Haase. "Many of them were at the patients' bedside when they passed. Some of them even volunteered to video conference with families so they could say goodbye."

"We may not have won every battle, but New York City is in a better place because of their efforts," said Haase.

Haase attributes the success of the team to their commitment to the job.

"(Air Force Reserve Command) was the contingency response force of this pandemic," said Haase. "Many of them responded to the call within hours of notification and they pushed through every obstacle. I'm proud to be a part of this total force team.'



sues, seeking care from a mental health professional is always encouraged for anyone who feels that they need a little bit of help. Benedek noted a national increase in patients making appointments for mental and physical health, which decreased significantly in the early stages of the pandemic. He attributed that increase to changes in the worries that people are having, and to the increase in telehealth or virtual health services for mental health care.

"One can make a phone call and get a tele-mental-health appointment and not have to worry about coming into a higher risk environment," Benedek said, "and people are starting to take advantage of that. So I think we will see increased utilization in the weeks and months ahead."

Although May offers opportunities to emphasize and reinforce resources and programs, mental health is a year-round focus with the DoD. O'Reilly said. "We constantly advance our research and analysis to improve prevention and treatment for the beneficiaries of the Military Health System."

Why convalescent plasma is collected

When a person contracts SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. their immune systems create antibodies to fight the virus. These antibodies are found in the plasma – the liquid part of blood, Taylor explained.

Plasma with infection-fighting antibodies is called convalescent plasma, she said. Through the blood donation process, this plasma is collected from a donor who has recovered from COV-ID-19 and may be transfused into a sick patient who is still fighting the virus, if they qualify for this type of treatment. The procedure may boost the immune system of the patient and help with the re- requirements, those who have covery process, Taylor said.

this type of plasma is the same least 14 days.

as standard apheresis collection, she noted. It is being investigated for the treatment of COVID-19 because there is no approved treatment for the disease at this time, and there is some indication that it might help some patients recover from COVID-19.

Several COVID-19 patients in the Military Health System have received convalescent plasma transfusions as part of their treatment, Taylor said. The treatment, which must be carried out under an approved protocol, is used for those hospitalized and severely ill with the disease.

Donating CCP is the same as a standard platelet or plasma donation and must meet specific requirements set by the Food and Drug Administration. Donors must be at least 17 years and older, weigh at least 110 pounds, and be in good health. Women who have ever been pregnant may need additional testing for specific human leukocyte antigen antibodies that may be present in their blood.

For exercises or contingencies, contracting officers have the same things on their minds.

"Doesn't matter where we go, we always have to think about food and fuel," said Abbate. "You wouldn't think getting food and fuel would be a challenge, but it can be."

When CR forces are tasked during a contingency, the unit brings enough food for a short period of time, which gives the contracting officers the opportunity to find a long-term solution.

"When we went to Tyndall the base provided meals for us, but that's not always the case,' said Abbate. "In other countries or more austere environments. we have to find other solutions."

On top of these necessities, contracting officers also have to consider other critical items.

"Tents, cots, potable water ... basic human needs," said Fowler. "These 'life support' items are important to sustain operations wherever we are."

The challenge for these items is some can't be acquired locally, said Fowler.

"Our large tents, showers and equipment aren't commercially available at many of the locations we go," he added. "So we rely on major military hubs to bring us what we need if we can't get it locally."

One item that regularly can't be brought in is restrooms.

"When we were in PSAB

[Prince Sultan Air Base, Saudi Arabia], restrooms can be tricky too," said Fowler. "For many contingencies, we use porta potties, but in Africa or the Middle East, we have to find 'western' style, ones that Americans are most familiar with."

Acquisition is a major aspect of the contracting AFSC, but in order to fulfill the obligations of a contracting officer, translators are key.

"If we're with our air advisors, many of them can communicate in local languages, but other times we have to use the tools at our disposal," said Fowler.
